Key Events

- AD 400** The **Yoruba** people start using iron tools that allow them to clear the forest land for the first time. Villages developed and chiefs emerged.
- AD 600** The area became one of the earliest kingdoms in the West **Ife** African Rainforest.
- AD 900** The Kingdom of **Benin** begins to develop and boundaries are created around the area of **Igodomigodo** (now part of Nigeria).
- AD 1091** The **Edo** people were ruled by the **Ogiso**, which means 'kings of the sky'.
- AD 1100** The last Ogiso of Igodomigodo, **Owodo**, dies and there is nobody to rule.
- AD 1180** **Eweka** becomes the new ruler and calls himself the **Oba**.
- AD 1300-1700** The 'golden age' of **Edo**. It has a large, powerful army and skilled craftspeople.
- AD 1489** When the **Portuguese** made contact with the Kingdom of Benin the name 'Benin' began to be used.

Benin City in Nigeria, is the location of the ancient Kingdom of Benin. It was **NOT** located in the modern country of Benin - this is a different country in West Africa.




Valuable Vocabulary

<b>Yoruba</b>	The name of the people who lived in the holy city of Ife.
<b>Edo</b>	The name of the people who lived within the ancient kingdom of Benin.
<b>Ife</b>	The holy city near the Kingdom of Benin, ruled by the Yoruba people
<b>Oba</b>	The Yoruba word meaning 'King'.
<b>Eweka</b>	The first Oba of the Kingdom of Benin. He came to power in AD 1180.
<b>Ogiso</b>	The Edo word meaning 'Kings of the Sky' used by the early rulers of <b>Igodomigodo</b> (the original name of the Benin Empire).
<b>Trade</b>	The exchanging of goods.
<b>Benin City</b>	The modern city located in Nigeria. It used to be called Edo and Igodomigodo, before that Ogiso – the Edo word.
<b>Brass</b>	A yellowish metal made from copper and zinc.
<b>Bronze</b>	A metallic brown metal made from copper and tin.
